They interact with other institutions and try to bring them to our campus for guidance and sometimes placements. The mentors of the institution arrange various seminars for the mentees. They allow mentees to express their views in selected topics and sometimes their desired topics. The mentors observe minutely the speech and body activities of the mentees. Through this process, the mentors came to know capacities and weakness of the mentees. The mentors note down their capacities and weakness. They suggest them how to improve their capacities and how to decrease their weakness. The parents meet plays important role in development of the students.
